4. Reviews

A. Saw MOONLIGHT, the drama that recently won the Oscar for Best Picture of the Year. It's the story of a young man's struggle to find himself, told across three defining chapters in his life. Another Oscar also went to Mahershala Ali Best Supporting Actor. ... I thought it was OK when I saw it, but now thinking about it some more, I realize that it was a very fine film. That said, I still don't think it should have beat LA LA LAND for the top film of the year. ... Rated R.

B. Now out on DVR is JACKIE, the portrait of the iconic First Lady--then Jacqueline Kennedy. Natalie Portman is excellent in the leading role, but overall, I wanted to know more about Kennedy's life. Instead, the film focuses on her life just before and right after the assassination. I also wasn't crazy about the music. Rated R, though methinks it would be appropriate for any mature teenager.

C. Read PAUL NEWMAN: A LIFE (Three Rivers Press) by Shawn Levy. I really enjoyed this book, probably in large part because I have seen just about all of the actor's films--and enjoyed most of them. ... I got a real behind-the-scenes view of his life, both on movie sets but also as an entrepreneur and philanthropist. ... In addition, I enjoyed reading about his long marriage to Joanne Woodward. This one passage perhaps sums it best:

For his part, Newman spoke of her in genuinely fond terms that meant to empathize her congeniality and allure but perhaps too often sounded laddish or indelicate. "She's the last of the great broads," he was fond of saying early in their marriage and then a few years later, famously and to his regret, he reasserted his monogamy by declaring, "I have steak at home; why should I go out for a hamburger?" (Chastened by Joanne for comparing her, in effect, to a piece of meat, he tried another metaphor. "She's like a classy '32 Bordeaux," he told a female interviewer. "No, make it '59. That's a year that ages well in the bottle. Will I get in trouble for that?")

D. Heard HARRIET TUBMAN: THE ROAD TO FREEDOM (Hachette Audio), written by Catherine Clinton and narrated by Shayna Small. The author did an excellent job of telling the story of this remarkable woman's life, particularly since there were so few written records. I found out that she had many reputations: to John Brown, leader of the Harpers Ferry slave uprising, she was General Tubman; for the many slaves she led to freedom, she was Moses; to the slaveholders who sought her capture, she was a thief; and to abolitionists, she was a prophet. ... I felt history truly coming alive as I learned about Tubman. And now I find myself wanting to know more about the Underground Railroad that Tubman used to help so many slaves.

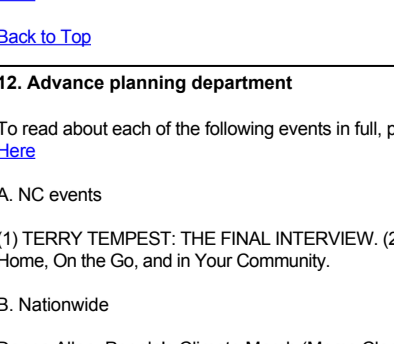
C. FEUD: BETTE AND JOAN: Series premieres on Sun., March 5, at 10 p.m. on FX
