


B. We celebrated our friend Tom Gallagher's birthday with his wife Marcy at a delicious dinner at Hemingway's Cuba Restaurant.





Dennis Quaid, as always, is watchable in one of the leading roles, and I also liked the work of Jay Hernandez and Cheech Marin. Rated PG.

C. THE SYMPATHIZER: Now on Max




