





Doing so, I found out numerous complaints--including this one: Got a call from 765-807-5100 (mid-state Indiana) for my husband (used his first name only) from Jay Carson with GDC. Surprisingly there was a Nov. 14th entry (that we don't recall). Told he won a prize and to call 888-624-8281. I then checked out that 888 number via Google and came across this website: Here

And found a similar comment that read as follows: Got a call today 3/22/2017 from J Carson he wanted to talk to my wife about winning a Grand Discovery contest she supposedly won. He said she had entered last Sept 17 in Jordan, NC. As she was out he said she could call back at 888-624-8281. He further added details about the contest saying that 250 people would be winners with one grand prize of a Ford Explorer, second place was round trip tickets and third prize winners of a Samsung smart large screen TV. My wife does not recall entering any contest so I googled the number!

A. Saw DECODING ANNIE PARKER, now available on disc/streaming. It's a story based on real events about Parker, a three-time cancer survivor and the geneticist Mary-Claire King whose discovery of the breast cancer BRCA gene mutation is considered one of the most important discoveries of the 20th century. ... Samantha Morton is terrific in the leading role, and I also liked the performances of both Helen Hunt and Rashida Jones. The subject might seem depressing, but this film is anything but that. ... Rated R, though certainly appropriate for mature teenagers.

B. Read IF I ONLY KNEW THEN ... LESSONS FROM OUR MISTAKES (Grand Central Publishing) by Charles Grodin and friends and friends of friends. ... The author, an actor I've long admired, asked 62 celebrities about lessons learned the hard way. ... Suzyn Waldman, a New York Yankees Radio broadcaster, shared this insight: "Instead of saying to myself that everyone makes mistakes, I focused on why it happened. From that day forward, I never went in as a child, especially when his friendliness so frequently went unrequited. But he didn't care if his clichés and corny jokes didn't get a smile from one person, they might from the next. So now, to the chagrin of my own teenage children, I do the same. It has made me a happier person."

C. Heard HOW TO MAKE PEOPLE LIKE YOU IN 90 SECONDS OR LESS (Listen & Live Audio), written and read by Nicholas Boothman. ... I'd especially recommend HOW TO MAKE PEOPLE LIKE YOU for those hoping to be in a relationship. Much of the advice presented here is relevant to that situation.


