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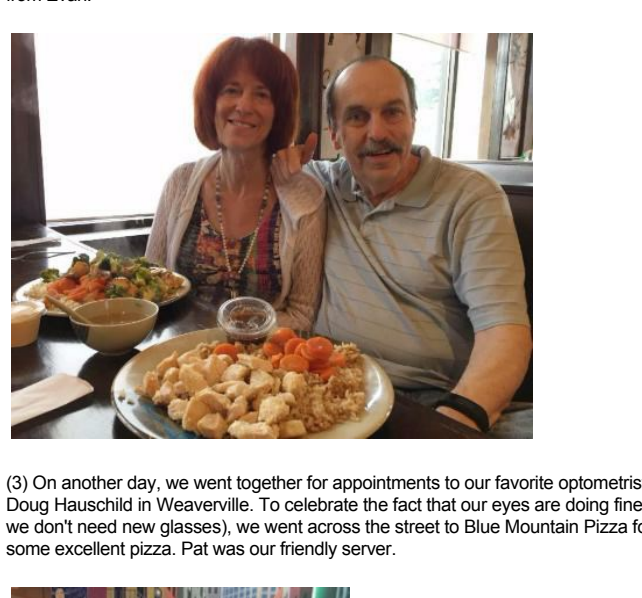

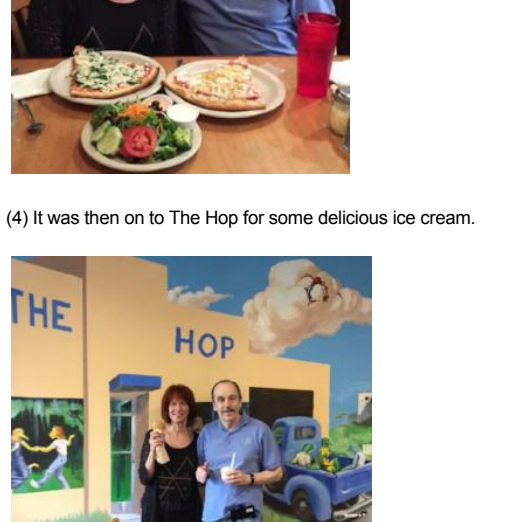

A. Cynthia, my beautiful bride, and I:

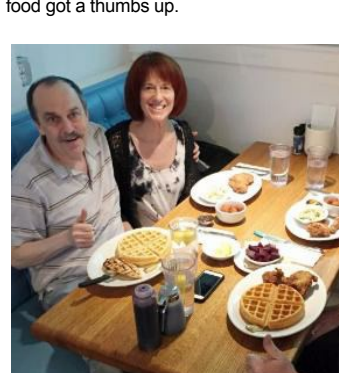

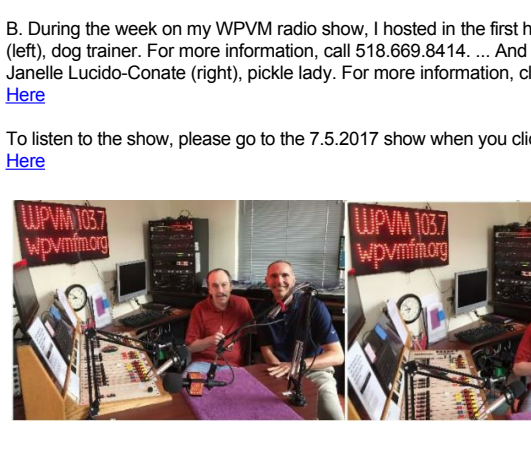

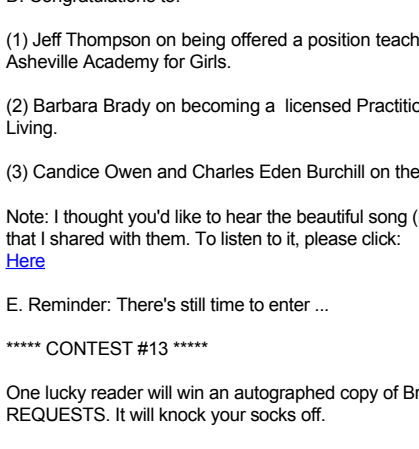
(4) It was then on to The Hop for some delicious ice cream.

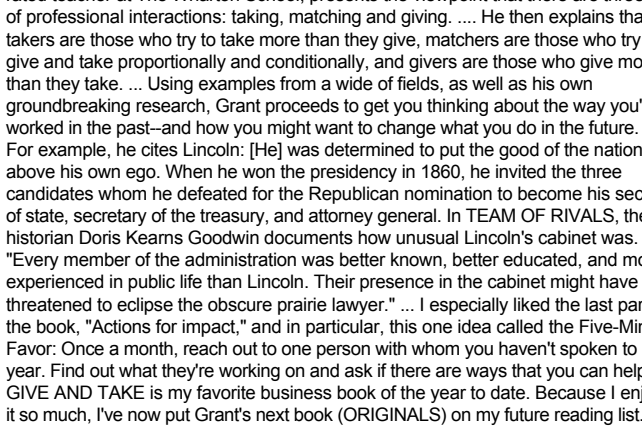

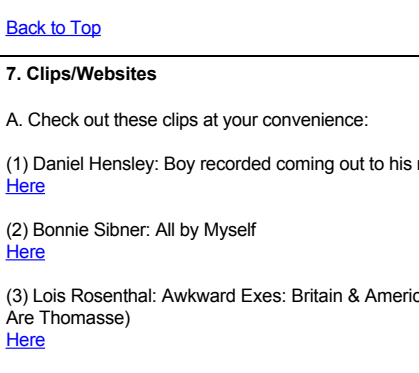

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4. Reviews

A. Saw THE BEGUILLED, a thriller set during the Civil War as a Southern girls' boarding school. An injured enemy soldier is taken in, and as he recovers, sexual tension and dangerous rivalries set in. Colin Farrell is quite good in the leading role, but the film is only fair. Wait until it comes out on DVD or even better, catch the 1971 version starring Clint Eastwood. It is superior. Rated R.

B. Now available on disc/streaming is CHRISTINE, the gripping true story about a Florida newscaster in pursuit of a job in a larger market. Rebecca Hall gives an Oscar-worthy performance in the leading role, and I also liked the work of both Michael C. Hall and Tracy Letts. I missed it when it was playing in the theatres, but I'm glad I saw it now. You will, too. Rated R.

C. READ GIVE AND TAKE: A REVOLUTIONARY APPROACH TO SUCCESS (Viking) by Adam Grant. ... The author, the youngest tenured professor and assistant rated teacher at The Wharton School, presents the viewpoint that there are three types of professional interactions: taking, matching and giving. ... He then explains that takers are those who try to take more than they give, matchers are those who try to give and take proportionally and conditionally, and givers are those who give more than they take. ... Using examples from a wide of fields, as well as his own groundbreaking research, Grant proceeds to get you thinking about the way you've worked in the past—and how you might want to change what you do in the future. ... For example, he cites Lincoln: [He] was determined to put the good of the nation above his own ego. When he won the presidency in 1860, he invited the three candidates whom he defeated for the Republican nomination to become his secretary of state, secretary of the treasury, and attorney general. In TEAM OF RIBALS, the historian Doris Kearns Goodwin documents how unusual Lincoln's cabinet was. "Every member of the administration was better known, better educated, and more experienced in public life than Lincoln. Their presence in the cabinet might have threatened to eclipse the obscure prairie lawyer." ... I especially liked the last part of the book, "Actions for impact," and in particular, this one idea called the Five-Minute Favor: "Once a month, reach out to one person with whom you haven't spoken to in a year. Find out what they're working on and ask if there are ways that you can help."

GIVE AND TAKE is my favorite business book of the year to date. Because I enjoyed it so much, I've now put Grant's next book (ORIGINALS) on my future reading list.

D. Heard IN SUCH GOOD COMPANY: ELEVEN YEARS OF LAUGHTER, MAYHEM AND FUN IN THE SANDBOX (Random House Audio), written and read by Carol Burnett. ... The award-winning woman comedian takes us back to 1967, when her show variety show first began, and looks at many of the 276 episodes that much it such a favorite. You'll get a kick out of the behind-the-scenes episodes featuring such performers as Harvey Korman, Tim Conway, Alan Alda, Aida Rodon, Tracy Morgan and many others. ... In addition, you'll smile at several of the Q&A sessions that are cited in the book—such as this one: "Did you take acting lessons?" "Yes. I did when I was at UCLA. I studied for a while. "Think it did you any good?" ... And: I'm asked if I've always had read hair. "To be honest, no. I was born bald." ... In addition, you'll get a kick out of revealing such "Went with the Wind" as: "Is there anything to Burnett's description of curtain rod dress. But my favorite part was her description of the time Korman went to the Conway who was playing a new dentist. ... If you liked the CAROL BURNETT SHOW, and I did, you'll love this book.
