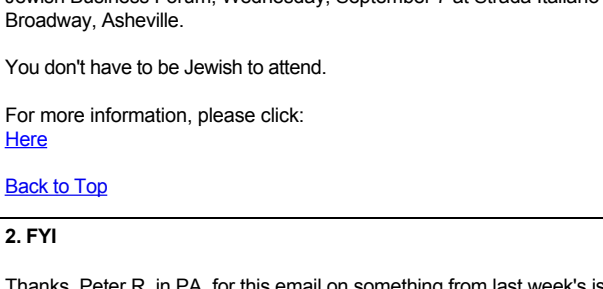

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3. Joke 1

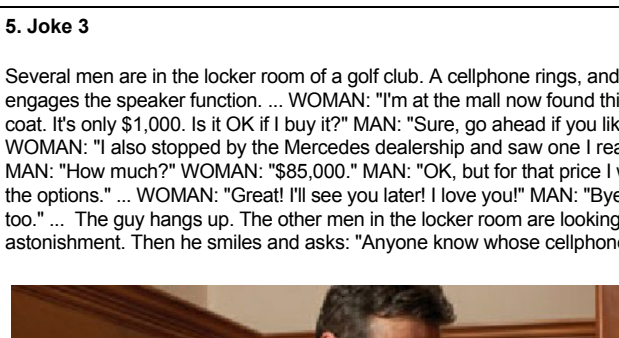

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4. Joke 2

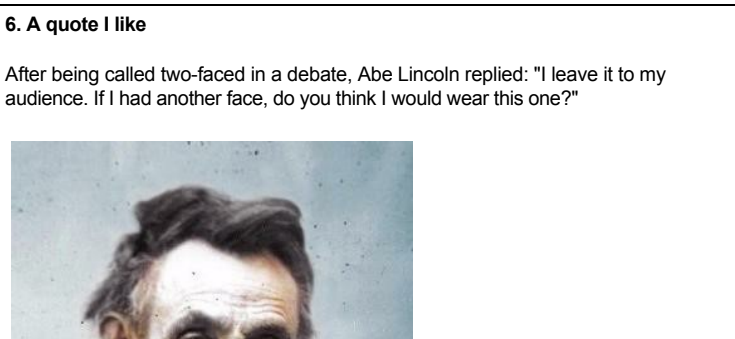
