Emily Shaules: Unlimited movies in theaters for \$10 a month? Hell yes!!!! And I checked __all the Asheville theaters are participating, even the Fine Arts and Grail.

I read about the above on Facebook and then Edwin Arnaudin, my favorite movie critic, provided some additional clarification on using the card. (Thanks, Edwin!) See below for some of his comments:

Unlimited = one per day; no 3D; day-of ticket purchases, all in person. That said, I saved around \$70 using it last month.

You can ONLY get them the same day you're seeing the movie (i.e. you can't purchase opening night Star Wars tickets today).

My understanding is that you can get your ticket earlier in the day at the theater, but I've yet to try that out.

When I go to Biltmore Grande, I just "check in" on the app on my phone, then go pick my seats at the self-serve kiosk like usual, but swipe my MoviePass card instead of a debit/credit card. At the Carolina, there's no kiosk, so you check in but then have to interact with a human.

You have to be within 100 yards of the theater to check in via the app. Then you have 30 minutes to get your ticket.

"The company reports that it works by buying movie theater tickets for its subscribers directly from exhibitors at whatever price they offer. That means that MoviePass is operating at a loss, and playing the long game. Sure, most movie theater owners would rather you buy their own loyalty programs. But if you balked at the idea for fear of ripping off your local indie picture house, feel free to proceed sans guilt."

The actual act of acquiring a ticket is much smoother than it sounds.

A. Saw *THREE BILLBOARDS OUTSIDE EBBING, MISSOURI*, a dramedy about a woman trying to track down the murderer of her daughter. Frances McDormand may well win another Academy Award for her performance in the leading role, and Sam Rockwell also deserves strong consideration for his work as a dimwitted police officer. Woody Harrelson and Peter Dinklage are also quite good in this film that has a terrific ending. Rated R.

B. On Netflix, I caught *HOLY HELL*--a powerful documentary about a Los Angeles cult known as The Buddhfield. I was fascinated to learn how the leader, Michael, managed to keep his followers in line for well over 20 years--and that the group still exists today even after disturbing facts about it came out. Not rated, but I wouldn't recommend it for anybody under the age of 15. It might be an excellent film for parents to watch and discuss with mature teenagers.

C. Read *PORTRAITS OF COURAGE: A COMMANDER IN CHIEF'S TRIBUTES TO AMERICAN WARRIORS* (Crown Publishing Group), written and illustrated by President George W. Bush who can be seen hard at work in the picture below. ...The former president only took up painting seriously after he left the White House, and this beautiful book shows that he has come quite far in a relatively short time. He portraits of 98 wounded men and women all catch your attention, and their stories will move

you. ... As he notes: I studied the stories and photographs of the warriors. As I painted them, I thought about their backgrounds, their time in the military, and the issues they dealt with as a result of combat--many from visible injuries, others from invisible wounds such as post-traumatic stress (PTS) and traumatic brain injury. ... I painted these men and woman as a way to honor their service to the country and to show my respect for their sacrifice and courage." ... Perhaps what I liked about the book was that President Bush will donate his net author proceeds to the George W. Bush Presidential Center, a non-profit organization whose Military Service Initiative works to ensure that post-9/11 veterans and their families make successful transitions to civilian life with a focus on gaining meaningful employment and overcoming the invisible wounds of war.

DeskPins

DeskPins can be used to make any application topmost, that is, to keep it above all other windows. Just grab a pin from the DeskPins icon in the system notification area and click on any window.
